The Important Bird Areas Program seeks to identify, protect, and conserve a network of sites that are important for the long-term viability of naturally occurring bird populations across their geographical range for which site-based conservation is appropriate...

Criteria are based on vulnerabilities

Important Bird Areas provide habitat for:

- Species of Conservation Concern (Globally Threatened)
- Restricted-range Species (Endemic Birds)
- Habitat-restricted Species (Biome-restricted)
- Congregations



Criteria are defined hierarchically: Global – established by BirdLife – global "currency" Continental – US, Mexico, Canada State – flexible, designed to meet State objectives Criteria adapted to work in US


