

Habitat for Humanity builds high quality homes that are safe and sustainable at a price middle income residents can afford.

Looking to build more homes in more places. In 2024 we expanded our service area to build in neighboring Greene County.



The Habitat Homeownership Program

The Habitat for Humanity program is a collaborative, community-supported model. We bring community together to build safe, affordable housing for those traditionally shut out of ownership opportunities.

Our program is based on three criteria:

- A demonstrated need for housing
- Ability to purchase a Habitat-constructed home through a 3rd party mortgage
- Willingness to partner in the construction through our "Sweat Equity" program.





OUR VISION

CURRENT CONTEXT

The Hudson River Valley region that we call home is becoming an increasingly unsustainable and inequitable place to live. A variety of factors have contributed to the present reality: single family sprawl over denser, smart growth development; the COVID-19 real estate boom; vulnerable existing rental housing, and the perception that affordable housing brings unwanted change to communities.
